## Old versus New

Hello to the community! My idea of a new topic is to compare old vs. new. For example, buildings. What do you like more? Old or new ones? Best regards, Martin

## Part One: Buildings

We had a very interesting conversation today about that! I think it is very hard to define if things are better or worse... For me it all depends on who is judging. But, regarding buildings, I think the news ones are more functional and safer – although the old ones are more romantic. What do you think? (Igor)

Yes, I think you are right. Every person is different. The new buildings have bigger windows. That means a lot of light. But the old buildings have more stories. That is also interesting. I like old buildings with modern decoration. For example, the Louvre in Paris with the Pyramid. The chic Pyramid makes the old building attractive. Poundberry in England is a new village built in an old style. (Wenya)

Old buildings don't need to have modern decorated ;-). But sometimes I like it when old meets new, too. In my opinion, you're absolutely right. They are more romantic. If you consider something like fire protection, it looks worse for the old houses. But it isn't romantic to be reasonable. (Martin)

Should we keep every old building or just public monuments? (Manfred)

I like your example with the Louvre because I like this building with all glass. I have another example; I live in an old building, but it was renovated, and my apartment is modern. That is beautiful. (Maxime)

### Part Two: Second Hand or New

### Do you like to buy new things or second-hand things or both??? (Wenya)

I think it is better to buy second-hand things for environmental and money-saving reasons. But, there are fewer problems with new things like computers or phones. The solution is maybe the circular economy. (Maxime)

Most of all, I like second-hand things, often it is the better quality for less money. It is a good move against Growth ideology, which of course cannot work forever. Recycling is also not always real recycling and is very costly. (Martin)

I think second-hand is a good idea, but I usually buy first-hand. (Manfred)

I use both. In Alsace, there are a lot of garage sales, second-hand stores, not to mention online sales sites between individuals, and we got caught up in the "game". I hate waste and I am less and less materialistic. So, I reduced my wardrobe and my surplus things. I'm more into second-hand.

But society pushes us to consume, and, for the clothes, appearance plays an important role. We are therefore forced to buy fashionable clothes, see targeted brands, to look better and more easily integrate into society (alas).

I also understand people who don't want second-hand for hygiene reasons, or want to buy new articles. Just as I understand the need to recycle, do something for the planet, spend the least money...

In addition, I notice that second-hand clothing is often of better quality, more durable since it passes between several users. I would not say the same thing about old electrical or computer devices which, even if they are more easily repairable, have a lifespan. (Nathalie)

## Part Three: Technology

Personally, I like new technology, because people can live more safely. Cars have become safer in the last years. Another example, you can be more productive with the latest technology. For example, 3D printers.

On the other hand, I prefer old cars to new ones, because I like the old design and sound. When you drive an old car, you are in another era. (Maxime)

I see it similarly to you. It depends on the situation and on the object. Most of all I would like to agree with what you wrote about the good old cars -I see it the same way. (Martin)

Modern design is not always practical. The dashboard of the Tesla is more distracting than that of a 20-year-old car. (Manfred)

## Part Four: Holidays

## Is it better to spend your holidays in the same place or to discover new places? (Manfred)

Sometimes It is nice to visit the same places, and sometimes to discover new places. I like landscape, I can see into the distance. I like ocean too, the boats, interesting experiences, fishing and fishermen. But I get seasick, that's unpleasant. I hope to visit Amsterdam again. I went to Marrakesh once, It was nice, but once is enough. I would like to visit Africa and England. (Wenya)

We don't like going to the same place. We prefer discovering other countries, regions. Otherwise, it is monotonous, it is a new discovery. Everything is the same. All countries and regions have their own charm. If you book a tour or do something more traditional, staying in one place. (Bernard & Monique)

We have visited many places in France, Argentina, South Africa, but we never revisit the same place. Generally, we stay for 2 days and then move to the next destination. (Clarisse)

### Part 5 General

Old or new, what is better? That's a good question! We can't affirm what is the best, it depends on the subject. For the buildings Martin, I think we have improved the construction, more effective against cold or heat, stronger, more practical, higher or with an optimum capacity. I can see that at Seoul. But I observe that we are constantly looking for improvement, and sometimes we backtrack and say that the old process was finally better. For example, half-timbered houses, as in Alsace, have proven themselves, as evidenced by my house, which is almost 300 years old. Either these fortified castles still standing have survived the centuries, climatic hazards, disasters and wars, solid and durable. Finally, I think that the new one is especially good to improve comfort and ease.

Maxime, you who are an engineer, you improve technology. You might think it simplifies our daily lives, but sometimes it complicates it. We are not all engineers and understanding even with the help of a technical manual is sometimes complicated. And the worst is when the new technology doesn't work, and it's blocking, preventing any operation.

Old or new? There is good and bad in both.

But we must not forget that we always have to learn from the past and from the ancients! (Nathalie)

I am impressed by your answer, and I agree with you. I also think that old buildings are stronger than new ones, and new ones are more comfortable with new technologies. In the future, we need to develop new construction technology to adapt to our future needs and growing population.

The role of an engineer is to solve problems, develop new technology to solve the problem and not live in the past. For that, we need to learn from the mistake of the past to have a better future. (Maxime)

Totally agree with you, Maxime.

Even if I prefer the old one, perhaps out of nostalgia and because it is something known and mastered, I am aware that we must evolve and improve again and again... The most difficult for engineers will be adapt and make the right choices. Doesn't that put too much pressure on you? (Nathalie)

### Part 6 Transportation (Maxime & Martin)

What is your opinion about old vs new transport? This discussion is relevant to my university studies. Thank you for starting this.

I know that you like old things, and you work on new trains. When do you know that new is better than old? Especially in your field of engineering. (Maxime)

On the negative side, the cost pressure is enormous. Imagine, a tram costs about 500.000 Euros. The product has to be ready by yesterday, cost nothing and do more. This is the dream of the customer and the nightmare of the manufacturers. On the positive side, there is the long lifecycle of a tram or train (30 to 60 years). This is extended with retrofits and upgrades. Because of that, there is more time to develop and test software and equipment. The national and European homologation criteria are very strict, because of health and safety regulations. Complete and

thorough documentation is essential. Therefore, we know that progress can be good if it is done properly. (Martin)

## Part 7 Mobile Communication

As you know I live in Seoul. I would like to say something about using the mobile phone here. The biggest difference between where I lived in France and here, is that here, you have to do everything with your phone; Public transport, maps, ID card...

Last week my friends and I decided, to rent bicycles, and we went to the Han River. But, when we had to rent the bikes, we had a hard time to download the application. It took us about 40 minutes... and all was written in Korean, luckily my friends are Korean, and could help me with the language. But then we had a good time !! (Cléa)

I know that is really different between different countries. You are right about Seoul, you need to have a mobile phone to do everything.

We begin to have the same in Laval, for example, you need an application on your phone to rent a public scooter. I find that I use my phone for everything in Laval and I also think that I can use my phone for everything in all cities in France. Is it a question of geography or simply modern life? (Maxime)

Mobile phones can make life easier, but it is not good if one is totally dependent on them. What do you do if the internet is down? Martin

### A thought-provoking dialogue written by Ismar

- Hello!
- Hello! How are you doing?
- Not too bad, but I am envious of you!
- Oh, you can type on a laptop!
- Why? It is something so common? Anyone can do this.
- Oh my friend, do not take things for granted.
- I got it, but why would you like to know how to type?
- I know how to type on a computer.
- Then, what is the matter?

— I was approved for a language course at Federal University, but as I cannot type my homework I had to quit it.

- I do not understand it, why?

— All professors require that students hand in their homework typed, mainly have to post them on a Google classroom or Ava platform. I cannot it.

— Why? what is the difficulty of that?

— In fact, as I said, I know how to type, but I cannot do it because I have problems with my hands and arms. It is too painful for me if I type a text, even a small one.

— Oh, that is a pity! I am studying Languages. I had a discipline when the professor showed us we should think critically and be an agent in our community.

— Have you talked to your professors and explained your case, that you cannot use a computer, and you would like to go on with your course? In a diverse thinking place, we can learn a lot from one another and develop our university community that will take this kind of thinking and behaviour for our society. And why not change and improve public policies for the social inclusion of all different people? — That is a different point of view. I have not heard of such a thing. But do you think I can retake my university course without using a computer?

— I am not 100% sure. Have you heard of Stephen Hawking? Besides Einstein, he is considered the greatest physicist we had in our recent history. He had a problem communicating, he did it using a voice synthesizer. Of course, the university cannot provide any technological device to solve your case, but you can try to use a different way to do your homework and tests.

- How could I do that?

- Can you by hand?

- Yes, but not too much, after a short time I feel pain too.

- Can you record your voice in a smartphone recorder?

- Yes, I can exchange audio messages with my friends and my family.

- All right, theoretically, we have the half the problem solved.

— How is that?

— Speak to your professors, tell them your case and ask them to hand your homework in recorded by voice and not written.
